SEVERE WEATHER PREPAREDNESS WEEK IN ILLINOIS MARCH 1 - 5, 2021

"THIS IS A PARTICULARLY DANGEROUS SITUATION..."

Have you ever noticed the wording "THIS IS A PARTICULARLY DANGEROUS SITUATION" in some of the severe weather watches issued by the NWS Storm Prediction Center?



This wording is used in Tornado Watches for rare situations when long-lived and intense tornadoes are likely.

This enhanced wording may also accompany Severe Thunderstorm Watches for widespread and exceptionally intense straight-line wind events.

BE PREPARED:



Review your severe weather safety procedures Know the safest place to seek refuge ahead of time Consider canceling or postponing outdoor activities Have multiple ways to receive a warning Inform others of the heightened risk


· Make sure all family members know the tornado safe location in your home

- Store an emergency kit in your safe location
- · Identify where to go if you are at work or school
- Make a family communications plan




During a Tornado



- · If you are caught outside, get in a car, buckle up, and try to drive to the closest sturdy shelter. NEVER seek shelter under a bridge, and only lie flat in a ditch as a last resort.
- · Go to a secure storm shelter if you are in a mobile home

Preparing your pets

- · Get your pets ready at the first sign of an approaching storm
- · Put your dog on a leash and your cat in a carrier
- Move all pets to the shelter well ahead of the storm
- · Include pet food and medicines in your emergency kit





· Avoid damaged areas

After a Tornado

· Stay off the roads to allow rescue workers clear passage

· Beware of downed power

lines, broken gas lines, and sharp/dangerous debris

· Follow instructions from local officials

The National Highway Traffic Safety
Administration (NHTSA) is kicking off their second annual Vehicle Safety Recalls Week on March 8. The focus: heightened awareness of the importance of checking for recalls twice a year and getting a recall repaired immediately — for free.

Vehicle Safety Recalls Week coincides with the week leading up to daylight saving time. Traditionally, this day has been a cue to check smoke detector batteries as you change your clocks. You should also make it a habit to check for vehicle safety recalls when daylight saving time begins and ends.

FREE RECALL CHECKS

Locate your Vehicle Identification Number (VIN), which is on the lower left of your car's windshield.



Visit NHTSA.gov and type in your 17-character VIN.

Schedule an appointment with your local dealer and get any outstanding recalls fixed for free.
