### What is the Major Case Squad of Greater St. Louis?

The Major Case Squad of Greater St. Louis became operational on May 1, 1965. The Squad originally covered a geographical area comprising of the Counties of St. Louis, St. Charles, Jefferson, and Franklin in Missouri, and Madison, St. Clair, and Monroe Counties in Illinois. Presently, the Major Case Squad has expanded its geographical area to include the Counties of Warren and Lincoln in Missouri and the Counties of Jersey, Macoupin, Bond, Clinton, and Randolph in Illinois. Currently, there are over 500 investigators in Missouri and Illinois who are members of the Major Case Squad of Greater St. Louis.

Upon activation, a Deputy Commander who heads the investigation, two Deputy Report Officers, and approximately fifteen to twenty investigators respond to the Command Post established by the requesting agency within two hours of activation. The initial activation is set for a number of days, and it can be extended with the permission of the Commander of the Major Case Squad.

The Major Case Squad of Greater St. Louis is recognized as being one of the top investigative squads in the United States and has a clearance rate of over eighty percent (80%) on the cases they are involved in. #### Illegal Fireworks Enforcement in O'Fallon

Over the past several years, we have seen a sharp increase in the number of residents setting off illegal fireworks in the city limits. These illegal fireworks have greatly increased in size and often resemble those from commercial fireworks displays. Illegal fireworks can cause serious burn and eye injuries as well as property damage. Each of these mortar type fireworks shoot projectiles that travel hundreds of feet into the air and must come down at some point, frequently on the roofs and property of others in the neighborhood. In addition, the loud noises of these large fireworks are a nuisance to many of our residents.

This year, the O'Fallon Police Department will be enforcing our city and state laws regarding fireworks. Our focus will be on large fireworks displays and officers will be issuing **citations** when probable cause exists. On the weekend of the Fourth of July, we will be bringing in additional officers to supplement the regular patrol crews to decrease response times to fireworks complaints. We love America as much as the rest of you, however, we have a responsibility to our residents to ensure a safe and quiet Fourth of July season. It is possible to have a fun Independence Day celebration without the illegal fireworks. Before you go out of state for your illegal fireworks, please think twice and save your money instead of watching it blow up in front of you.

For those of you that still want to view fireworks, the City will be hosting a fireworks display at the Sports Park on July 3, 2022. The Ordinance prohibiting fireworks can be viewed here:

### See Lucas in action!

Last month we introduced you to the newest OEMS employee, Lucas. You might have already seen Lucas in the field. He has already proven that he is a hard worker. This month, we wanted to provide a step-by-step guide on how we use the Lucas device to quickly and effectively provide compressions for a patient in cardiac arrest. A special thanks to our EMS Explorer Lucas McMinn for the demonstration.

**Step 1**: OEMS begins hands on CPR while the Lucas is deployed. Our goal is to start compressions early and minimize interruptions in chest compressions.

**Step 2**: The patient is rolled, and a back plate is placed under the patient's upper back.


**Step 3**: the top of the unit is clicked into place, and the suction cup is adjusted for each individual patient's size.








Step 4: Lucas is powered on and set to begin continuous high-quality compressions. Reminder: as long as Lucas is charged, he never gets tired and always performs better than even his fittest human coworkers.



Step 5: When the team is ready to move, the patient is secured to the device with the hand cuffs and neck strap. Lucas can keep compressing through almost anything including narrow spaces where a human compressor would not fit. Helping improve outcomes during transport.



Here is OFR's newest addition to our training area at Station 4. It is a four-container, two-story burn tower.

Live fire training is essential in the fire service. It teaches firefighters how to fight fires safely and effectively in a controlled setting under supervision. Under live-fire conditions, firefighters can view the phases of fire and its development while learning the various types of nozzle patterns and their effect on thermal layering and how fire visibility changes by upsetting the thermal layer. Our department prides itself on our training and we feel this addition will benefit our department and our district greatly by allowing our firefighters to stay in district while obtaining live fire training.

Though there are a few finishing touches left before the project is complete, we are looking forward to using it when it is ready!
