Caritas Family Solutions is a nonprofit social services agency that works to meet the physical, social, and emotional needs of vulnerable people in Southern Illinois, from before birth through the golden years.

When a woman of any age experiences an unplanned pregnancy, she may also suddenly find herself homeless. Her family may kick her out and her partner may abandon her. She may have a substance abuse problem, be involved in human trafficking, or be the victim of domestic violence. Her choices are extremely difficult, as she is now alone and carrying a tremendous responsibility.

Through the support of the case manager and around the clock House Mentors, each resident develops action steps and milestone goals that build upon each other to help her succeed as an independent successful woman and mother.

Program Statistics

- The average Annual Operational Cost is \$175,742
- Average length of stay is 11 months.
- Served a total of 102 moms since 2010
- The average age of women served is 24 years old.
- 90 babies have been born since 2010.

Last year, EMS was invited to join the existing peer support structure run by PD. This was a no brainer and we have been thrilled with sharing resources and ideas across departments. We sat down with peer support liaison Paramedic Patty Hefner to talk about her work and passion for mental health.



Why does a multi-department approach work well for your peer support team? We've found that when it comes to public safety we are all a team with different specialties. By having such a broad range of professional experience we can provide a tailored response to any individual that reaches out for help. We want to get it right the first time when the stakes are high.


Why is mental health important to this team? Mental health is a matter of crew readiness. We'd never let our coworkers and community partners go into the field with a blown knee. Its not so different, except it can be harder to see and harder to ask for help. We need to stay healthy for ourselves, families, and the citizens we serve.



What is the most important contribution to the peer support structure? I have been given the opportunity to attend a wealth of training as the peer support liaison. One of the best ways we support the department is through Critical Incident Stress Debriefings. After critical calls, anyone who was on scene or involved in care from dispatch all the way down to the hospital staff is given a chance to come together for a guided debriefing. This has been shown to speed healing and allow providers to see that no one has to struggle alone. I am part of an in-house team that can quickly provide this kind of care.

What kinds of things do you do to minimize stress in your job? I make it a practice to "keep my boots at work" meaning that I don't take work home and I don't bring home to work. It lets me be "Paramedic Patty" at work and a mom and wife at home. Outside of that, I like to workout both on and off duty. It helps me to be the best version of myself.

Stop The Bleed in MAY!

May is Stop the Bleed awareness month. Stop The Bleed is the lay person's answer to dealing with serious bleeding with limited tools and minimal training. Last year, O'Fallon EMS took on the impressive task of training every district 90 employee in this life saving skill set. We estimate that over 600 unique individuals had hands on and classroom learning on bleeding control. Staff learned how important they can be in the chain of survival and were given the tools and skills to provide life saving care. This ranges anywhere from how to properly apply pressure to how and when to deploy a tourniquet for single limb hemorrhages. 
