Please take a moment to discuss the following safety tips from <u>SafeKids.org</u> with your children:

- Cross the street at corners, using traffic signals and crosswalks. Look left, right and left again when crossing and keep looking as you cross.
- Put electronic devices down, keep heads up and walk, don't run, across the street.
- Teach children to make eye contact with drivers before crossing in front of them.
- Always walk on sidewalks or paths. If there are no sidewalks, walk facing traffic as far to the left as possible. Children should walk on direct routes with the fewest street crossings.
- Watch for cars that are turning or backing up. Teach children to never dart out into the street or cross between parked cars.
- Join kids under age 12 for trickor-treating. If kids are mature enough to be out without supervision, tell them to stick to familiar areas that are well lit and trick-or-treat in groups.

Trick-or-Treat hours for the City of O'Fallon are from 6 – 9 p.m. Monday, October 31, 2021.

We would like to remind everyone of the "Porch Light Code".

- If you are welcoming trick-or-treaters to knock on your door, leave your porch light, or driveway light on.
- If you do not wish to have trick-or-treaters approach your home and door, please leave your porch light, or driveway light off on Halloween.

Trick-or-treaters should only approach well-lit homes and residences. Please pass by any locations that do not have their lights on.

To prepare for trick-or-treaters:

- •Clean up. Put away tripping hazards, such as garden hoses, toys and bikes. Clear wet leaves and other debris from the sidewalk.
- •Turn the lights on. Replace burned-out bulbs to ensure visibility at the walkway and front door.
- •Control your pets. Take no chances that your pet might be frightened and chase or bite a child at your door.

Metro-East Communications (MECOMM) dispatches for three fire departments as well as the Mutual Aid Box Alarm System (MABAS) Division 32, which is comprised of multiple fire departments throughout the area who respond for large scale mutual aid incidents. Only a few of our 9-1-1 Telecommunicators have true firefighting experience. Those who do not rely on training and knowledge provided to them initially and through experiences while on the job. Recently, the Illinois Fire Service Institute hosted a two-day in-service training for dispatchers to participate in radio communication drills, extrication exercises, technical rescue, live fire, and hands-on training in realistic environments. Attendees had the opportunity to "connect the dots" between the moment the call is taken and what occurs on the scene of an incident.


Telecommunicators Teresa Wuest and Shaina Fauss attended and as you can see in the photos had a busy, but very enlightening experience.
